# November Reflections - Time and Light

November always arrives with a mixture of feelings. The clocks have gone back, the days feel shorter and suddenly we are walking the dog, collecting the children or returning from work in the dark. Many of us feel the tug of winter drawing near, and it can be easy to let the gloom settle on our spirits.

Yet this month also offers us reminders of brightness. Fireworks split the night sky with colour, Bonfire Night gatherings remind us of warmth and community, and soon the glow of Advent candles and Christmas lights will be upon us. Even in the darkest season, light still has the power to break through.

The Bible speaks about time and light in profound ways. The writer of Ecclesiastes tells us that there is "a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven" (Ecclesiastes 3:1). Time is not simply something we measure with clocks and calendars; it is a gift from God. The turning back of the clocks might serve as a small reminder that our days and seasons are in His hands. How we use this time matters: to draw closer to God, to care for one another, and to live lives that reflect His love.

And into the shortening days comes the great promise of Jesus: "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life" (John 8:12). Fireworks burn bright and fade quickly, but the light of Christ is steady and eternal. It shines in the darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it (John 1:5).

So as our clocks go back and our evenings grow longer, let's set our hearts forward. Let's use this season to be people who carry the light of Christ into the world: offering kindness where

there is need, hope where there is despair, and joy where there is sorrow. A single candle can transform a dark room; in the same way, the light of Christ in us can bring transformation to our communities.

May this November be for us not just a season of longer nights, but a season of deeper faith, renewed hope, and the steady glow of God's eternal light.

# Pope John Paul II and the Beggar Priest



In this week of the momentous meeting between King Charles and Pope Leo at the Vatican, I would like to share with you a story about Pope John Paul II.

A Priest from New York went to Rome for an audience with Pope John Paul II. Whilst in Rome, before his meeting he decided to go to a

church to pray. As he walked through the door, he saw a beggar sitting on the steps, which is not uncommon, and yet he sensed something familiar about him. When he had finished praying, he walked back out and decided to speak to the beggar, at which time they realised that they knew each other and had gone to Seminary together. The beggar revealed how he had been a Priest and had 'crashed and burned' in his vocation.

Later, when the Priest had an audience with the Pope, he joined the line of people who were processing past, and when his turn came, he gave in to a holy impulse and fell to his knees asking the Pope to pray for the beggar he had met earlier, telling him of how he was a Priest but had now fallen on hard times. The Pope gave the Priest an invitation to bring the beggar to dinner with him that evening.

The Priest immediately went from St Peter's to the small church and found the beggar was still on the steps. The Priest told the beggar of the invitation they had been given from John Paul II. The beggar said that he could not possibly do such a thing, but the Priest insisted telling him he was not going to this meal without him. He then took the beggar to his hotel room and gave him a loan of his razor and some clothes.

The two men arrived an hour later at the Papal apartments and sat down and ate a meal with the Pope. After the meal, the Pope asked the Priest to kindly leave him alone with his friend. The Priest found out, later that evening, what had happened when he left the room: The Pope turned to the beggar and said, "Would you hear my confession?" The beggar replied, "but I am not a Priest anymore!" The Pope then told him, "once a Priest, you are always a Priest." But the beggar told the Pope that he was out of good standing with the church. The Pope replied, "I am the Bishop of Rome, I can reinstate you right now," which he then does. The Pope then knelt before the beggar and confessed his sins. The beggar-Priest barely got the words of absolution out before he fell on his knees and with tears in his eyes asks the Pope to hear *his* confession.

Once the beggar-Priest was restored to Christ and in a state of grace, the Pope asked the other Priest to come back into the room. The Pope asked him which church he had found his friend at, upon learning he then told the beggar-Priest, "for your first pastoral assignment I want you to go to this church and report for duty, because you will be an associate Priest there, with a special outreach to your fellow beggars on the street." And that is where the beggar is today, fulfilling his new priestly role ministering to the homeless and the beggars on the steps of the very church where he himself had begged.

# From your Editor

One of my pet hates when watching a quiz show on TV is when a clueless young contestant, faced with a question about e.g. the Beatles, bleats "I don't know. It was before my time!" It happens with depressing regularity – even "Only Connect" isn't immune these days – and is usually accompanied by a furious tirade from me (Jane will testify to this). Something that I've come to realise in my 52 years is that 99% of recorded history happened before I was born (I've looked this up!) and some of

it was quite interesting. I would encourage people everywhere to check out the works of Dickens, Mozart and Laurel & Hardy; to look up the Moon landings, the Industrial Revolution and the Battle of Hastings; maybe even find out what was going down in Judea about 2000 years ago. There's loads more!

November is a month of Remembrance. On Remembrance Sunday we will commemorate all who gave their lives in service to ensure the freedoms we enjoy today. There have been some voices out there questioning why we continue to do this so many years after the end of the World Wars. Among the many and various important reasons that we **do** and **should** continue, is this: "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it" (George Santanaya).

I don't know about you, but I was very disturbed by the 'Unite the Kingdom' rally held in London, organised by a far-right activist with some very unsavoury views, which attracted such a worryingly large crowd. Perhaps some in that crowd will be standing in silence on Remembrance Sunday to honour those who died fighting fascism in the 1940s?

There are many issues to deal with at the moment in our beleaguered country, but the news this year has been dominated by stories of protests and riots regarding immigration and small boats. Watching violent 'protesters' on TV rioting and setting fire to hotels put me in mind of the antisemitic attacks of the 1930s on London's Jewish community by Oswald Mosely's Blackshirts. I confess that it's all left me feeling very uneasy and I pray to God that we can ultimately rely on the traditional British sense of justice and decency to prevail in the long term.

When we stand before our God to honour the Fallen this Remembrance Sunday, let's also pray for a renewal of peace, compassion and tolerance in our nation, and that we don't repeat the mistakes and iniquities of the past.

The beginning of the Advent season this year falls on Sunday 30<sup>th</sup> November and will be marked by the traditional 'From

Darkness to Light'. This contemplative and atmospheric service of Advent carols and readings is a wonderful introduction to the Advent season and well loved by those who attend and take part. It will be held at St Michael's Church beginning at 6pm

#### Remembrance

Remembrance Sunday this year falls on 9<sup>th</sup> November. St Michael's Church will be hosting the Remembrance service in Maesteg at 10am, led by Rev Rick, in the presence of, among others, civic dignitaries, the Royal British Legion, members of the armed forces and representatives of the community's schools. As in previous years, following the service in the church, there will follow a march from the church down to the War Memorial in the town centre, where the wreathes will be laid, the Last Post sounded and the two minute silence held at 11am.

On the same morning, Rev Lisa will lead a Remembrance service at St John's, Glyncorwg at 10:15am. This will be followed by the observations at the village War Memorial.

There will also be a Remembrance service and observations led by Rev Bev Reaney held at the Caerau War Memorial, Caerau Square, beginning at 10:30am.

On Remembrance Day itself, Tuesday 11<sup>th</sup> November, Rev Rick will lead a short service and the 2 minute silence at 11am at the War Memorial in Maesteg.

I look forward to the start of the Remembrance assemblies for this month.






Many thanks to Sue Thomas for stepping in while Mandy is unwell

As we know, he has been a faithful member of our church for many years and, before handing over his conductor's baton to daughter Susan in 2023, had served as a longstanding, long suffering, dedicated choirmaster of St Michael's Church Choir for over 35 years, having been appointed in December 1988. He arranged all the music for church and choir and ensured the choir was prepared, not only for the many special occasions that he directed, but for every Sunday service, overseeing the musical celebration of countless festivals of the church year. For his notable and significant contribution to the musical life of our

church we express our heartfelt gratitude and send best wishes to him for a very happy birthday. Enjoy this special occasion with your family. Happy 90<sup>th</sup> birthday, maestro!

#### Lt Charles Oxborrow

Every November, our thoughts inevitably turn to Remembrance; our churches hold special services to remember those that have died in time of war and conflict and indeed the buildings themselves have memorial plaques and windows dedicated to those whose lives were lost, but how many of you have noticed the small brass plaque on the altar rails in St Michael's Church or realise that those rails are themselves a 'war memorial'? The plaque reads:

To The Glory of God and in Memory of

Lieut. Charles Ernest Oxborrow, D.S.C. R.N., Yeoman Sydney B. Bennett and Able Seaman Charles Thorn of the submarine P.54 Unshaken who lost their lives at sea

25th November 1942.

These rails are the gift of Mrs Hazel Oxborrow and the members of the ship's company.

Dedicated 29th June 1944.

Charles Oxborrow was born in 1916 in Suffolk, his father died in the Great War when he was only 2 years old. Charles joined the Royal Navy as an ordinary seaman; he was clearly an excellent naval rating and in 1937 he was commissioned as an officer. On 23<sup>rd</sup> September 1939, just after war was declared, he married Hazel Elaine Bowser, daughter of Idris John Bowser and Mary Eliza (neé Marks) of 'Redlands', 67, St Michael's Road, and Maesteg became his home when he was not away at sea.



In October 1939, he transferred to the submarine service and was involved in many patrols against the enemy, receiving the Distinguished Service Cross (DSC), one of the highest decorations for naval gallantry, in May 1942 "for daring enterprise and devotion to duty in successful patrols in H.M. submarines". That same month he took his first command of a submarine, HMS *Unshaken* P.54 (pictured here in Malta,

1943), providing cover for convoys in the arctic. In October 1942, *Unshaken* was ordered to sail to the Mediterranean as part of a successful invasion of French North Africa, "Operation Torch", and then to hunt German ships in the area.

Late in the afternoon of 25<sup>th</sup> November 1942, HMS *Unshaken* surfaced in the Gulf of Lyon in very rough seas and Lt. Oxborrow and two crewmen, Yeoman of Signals Sydney Bertie Bennett (aged 26, and who had himself recently been awarded the Netherlands Bronze Cross for bravery whilst serving on a Dutch submarine) and Able Seaman Charles Richard Thorn (23), went up on to the conning tower on lookout. Suddenly the submarine was hit by waves and slid back underwater washing the three men overboard; although the submarine resurfaced quickly, no trace of the men was ever found.

On 19<sup>th</sup> December 1942, Mrs Oxborrow gave birth to their son, Roger Charles, but further tragedy was to strike as little Roger died less than two months later.

So next time you kneel at the altar rail in St Michael's, please remember these three young men and their families and the supreme sacrifice that they, and so many others, made.

That was the headline for an obituary that caused Alfred Nobel, the inventor of Dynamite to make a course correction in his life. The newspaper however had made a mistake, as Alfred was very much alive. It was his brother, Ludwig who had died. It is believed that when Alfred realised he would be remembered for a dangerous invention that claimed many lives that he decided to donate most of his significant wealth to establishing an award for those who had benefitted humanity. It became known as the *Nobel Prize*.




